What are Invasive Plants ?

An invasive species is an introduced organism that negatively alters its new environment. Although their spread can have beneficial aspects, invasive species adversely affect the invaded habitats and bioregions, causing ecological, environmental, and/or economic damage. In some cases invasive plants cause trees to be slowed in their growth. Contact a local ISA Certified Arborist on the best means of control and eradication of these invasive plants.

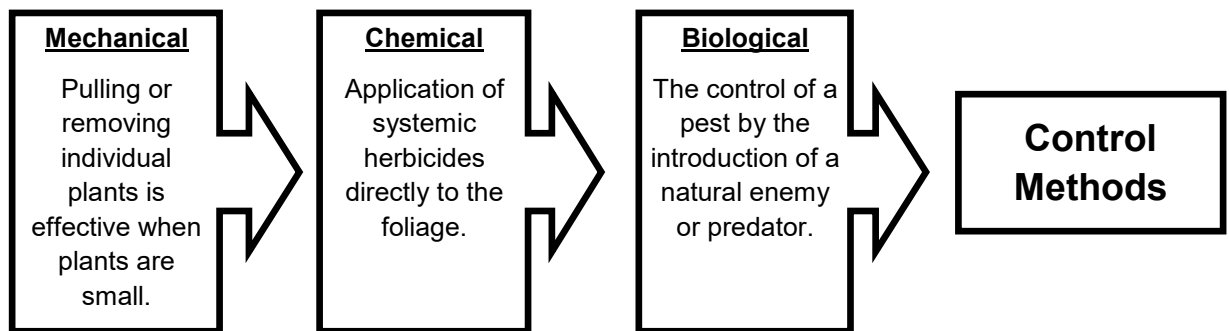
